As we approach the end of the school year, this half term is a good time to reflect on your child's progress and enjoy shared activities at home. The longer days and warmer weather also bring new opportunities to read, talk and learn together in simple ways.

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KEY EVENTS IN THE CALENDAR:

EMPATHY DAY FESTIVAL

2nd-12th JUNE

Empathy Day is all about helping children understand and connect with other people's feelings. Created by **EmpathyLab**, the festival uses stories to show how kindness, listening and imagination can help us build more caring communities. Empathy isn't something we're born with – it's a skill we can grow, and books are one of the best ways to do that.

When children read about someone who is lonely, nervous, excited or brave, they start to see the world from another point of view. This helps them recognise feelings in themselves and others, and to think about how their actions might make someone feel.



At home, you might enjoy some of these gentle ways to explore empathy through stories and conversations:

Talk about characters' feelings:

After reading a story together, ask questions like "How do you think they felt?" or "What would you have done in that situation?"

Draw a feelings map:

Choose a character from a favourite story and draw a simple timeline of how their emotions change. Use colours, emojis or simple drawings to show different moods.

Kindness jar:

Write down kind things your child does, or that others do for them, on small slips of paper. Read them out together at the end of the week.

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Swap roles in a story:

Ask your child to retell a familiar story from a different character's point of view. What might the dragon, the teacher or the little brother have thought?

Share a time you needed empathy:

Talk about a moment when someone listened to you, helped you or made you feel better. These small stories show that empathy matters at every age.

Learning empathy helps children build friendships, manage feelings and understand others – all skills that support their wellbeing and confidence as they grow.


TROLL

SARAH BOWIE (AUTHOR AND ILLUSTRATOR)



Perfect for fans of Wimpy Kid, Dork Diaries and Lottie Brooks.



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

Will has the wrong shoes — he's always known it but doesn't know how to change it. Navigating the difficulties of home and school when you feel you stick out is tough, but finding confidence with the help and empathy of friends can be all you need to see the way.







GREAT BIG GREEN WEEK

7th-15th JUNE 2025

Great Big Green Week is the UK's biggest celebration of community action to protect the environment. It's a chance to help children understand how everyday choices, like saving energy, reducing waste or protecting wildlife, can help care for the planet we all share.

For children, stories about nature can spark wonder and curiosity. They can also provide a gentle way to talk about big topics like climate change or pollution without causing fear. Even small activities, like watching a bee or recycling a bottle, can help children feel they are making a difference.



Here are some simple, practical ways to explore these ideas at home:

Recycled craft:

Use safe household materials, like cardboard tubes, boxes or bottle tops, to create an animal or nature scene inspired by a book.

Make a nature log:

Encourage your child to draw or write about the things they see on a short walk: birds, bugs, leaves or clouds. Even a windowsill or balcony can offer something to notice.

Eco-story basket:

Gather books about animals, plants or the seasons. You could add small toys, natural items or photos to create a story basket to explore.

Be a Green Detective:

Read a book about the environment, then go on a 'green mission' to find five things at home that help the planet (e.g. a reusable bag, a compost bin or a switch turned off).

Share your family's green habits:

Talk about something your family already does to help nature, perhaps walking instead of driving or growing herbs on the windowsill. These small routines show children that they can have an impact

Green Week is about noticing, appreciating and protecting the natural world, in whatever way is possible for your family.

Who is the perpetrator of this heinous crime? Will justice be done?




HOW TO TEACH GROWN-UPS ABOUT CLIMATE CHANGE: THE CUTTING-EDGE SCIENCE OF OUR CHANGING PLANET

Never has there been a more perfect time to empower children to take the lead and educate their grown-ups about climate change. Featuring a foreword by internationally renowned climate scientist **Dr Michael E. Mann** and bursting with fabulous original illustrations, this delightfully witty book deals with the pressing topic of our changing planet in an uplifting, positive manner. Interwoven amongst the more serious questions — why is Earth so special in the first place? How do we know about climate change? What causes it? How can we recognise false information? Fun-filled facts about cow burps, woolly mammoths, panda-shaped solar panels, and much more.

Crucially, this book also equips children and adults alike with the practical tools they need to tackle climate change in their everyday lives. And there's a handy quiz at the end so that you can check your grown-up has been paying attention!






THE EXTRAORDINARY COLOURS OF AUDEN DARE

ZILLAH BETHELL (AUTHOR)

Auden Dare has an unusual perspective on life: he cannot see in colour. He's always had this rare condition — and life is beginning to get harder for Auden. The war for water that is raging across the world is getting a little closer all the time. It hardly rains any more, anywhere. Everyone is thirsty all the time, and grubby, and exhausted. Auden has to learn to live without his father, who is away fighting, and has had to move to a new town with his mother, and start a new school, where everyone thinks he's a weirdo. But when he meets Vivi Rookmini, a smiling girl bright with cleverness, his hopes begin to lift.

It soon becomes clear to Auden, though, that there are some strange things afoot in his new hometown. He and his mother have moved into the old cottage of his recently-dead uncle Jonah Bloom — a scientist and professor at the university. The place is in disarray — and although Auden's mother tells him it's because Jonah was a messy old thing, Auden knows differently. Someone else did this — someone who was looking for something of Jonah's. Auden had heard too that Jonah was working on something that could cure Auden's condition — could this be it?

Then Auden and Vivi make an extraordinary discovery. Hidden away under the shed at the bottom of Jonah's garden is an engimatic and ingenious robot, who calls himself Paragon. A talking, walking, human-like robot. Apparently built by Jonah — but why? The answer to this will take Auden and Vivi on a thrilling journey of discovery as they seek to find out just what exactly Paragon is — and what link he has to Auden — and find that the truth is bigger and more wonderful than either of them could have imagined.





WINDRUSH DAY

22ND JUNE

Windrush Day marks the arrival of the HMT Empire Windrush at Tilbury Docks in 1948, carrying people from the Caribbean who came to help rebuild Britain after the war. It's a day to remember the contributions, struggles and successes of the Windrush Generation and their descendants.

For children, it can be a chance to learn about migration, identity and belonging through the eyes of characters their age. Stories about families coming to the UK, adjusting to a new culture or keeping traditions alive can help children value the richness of our shared history.





Here are a few ways to bring Windrush stories into family life:

Share family stories:

Talk about where your family is from, whether that's another country or region. What was the journey like? What stayed the same? What changed?

Create a memory collage:

Inspired by the idea of bringing a piece of home with you, make a picture using drawings, cut-outs or words that show the people, places or memories that matter most to your family.

Explore Caribbean culture:

Try a recipe, song or poem from the Caribbean and talk about what you notice. Many libraries have books, CDs or displays that celebrate Windrush heritage.

Read real stories:

Choose books based on true experiences or inspired by historical events. Talk about what the characters faced and what helped them feel at home.

Windrush Day is about learning from the past and celebrating the contributions of Caribbean communities to life in Britain today.



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Recommended Reads:

Download four free <u>A River of Stories</u> anthologies containing stories and poems from each of the countries of the Commonwealth.


THE GOOD TURN

GETTING READY FOR CHANGE (TRANSITION)

END OF YEAR REFLECTIONS

As the school year comes to an end, many children begin to think about what's next. They might be moving to a new classroom, saying goodbye to a teacher or even starting a new school altogether. While this can be exciting, it can also bring uncertainty.

Stories about change and new beginnings can help children make sense of their feelings and see that they are not alone. Books offer comfort, normalise worries and spark useful conversations.



Here are some gentle and supportive ways to explore transition at home:

Talk about feelings:

Read a story where a character faces change. Ask what helped them feel brave or what they were worried about. Connect this to your child? own experience.

Picture what's next:

Encourage your child to draw or describe what they think their new class or school might be like. Use their ideas as a way to talk through questions and expectations.

Make a memory box or booklet:

Collect drawings, photos or little notes about this school year. Looking back can help children feel proud and ready to move forward.

Share a story from your own childhood:

Talk about a time when you had to start something new. Children often enjoy hearing how grown-ups felt in similar situations.

Transitions can feel big or small, but with support and stories, children can face them with confidence and hope.

LYDIA CORRY (AUTHOR)

With colourful pages thronging with modern city life, Mooncat and Me tells the story of Pearl as she overcomes the anxiety of moving house and starting a new school, with the help of a giant white cat.

We can all empathise with Pearl's fear that 'I won't know anyone, and no one will know me' but as we watch her grow in confidence, we will learn that with a bit of imagination and determination, there's nothing we can't do.

The gorgeous, brightly coloured illustrations are full of busy people filling pavements and buses and cars, or seen through the windows of their homes, leading their different lives. Mooncat's own calm and reassuring presence encourages Pearl to explore the vibrant city with her mother, and to face school, where she soon finds there are friends to be made.




THE CURSE OF THE SCHOOL RABBIT

And when Snowflake unexpectedly comes to stay just before Christmas and EVERYTHING starts to go wrong, it looks like Tommy might be right. Even if he is getting more pocket money for feeding it and might be able to get that new bike after all... With a sick sister left in bed, a snobby actor left with suspiciously damp trousers, and no rabbit anywhere to be seen, Tommy can see his hopes of a new bike for Christmas disappearing as fast as Snowflake. 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
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FRANKIE'S WORLD

What part of nature your child enjoys or feels connected to


One small change your family could try — like turning off taps or bringing a bag for life A story where nature plays an important role and how it made your child feel

ISABELLA TREE (AUTHOR), ALLIRA TEE (ILLUSTRATOR)



When Little Fish and her family encounter an odd new fish bobbing along on its own, they embark on an exciting journey to reunite it with its family. But Odd Fish isn't the only creature who needs Little Fish's help. Turtle has a tummy ache and Octopus's tentacles are tangled. Clever readers will spot the one thing that links them all... plastic. Maybe Odd Fish doesn't belong in the sea after all? Eight million tonnes of plastic find their way into our oceans and rivers every year. That's equal to dumping one rubbish truck every minute into the sea!



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
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INTERVIEW WITH A SHARK AND OTHER OCEAN GIANTS TOO

One day, when they're running late, the little girl discovers what the woman does with her bag each morning — a surprise that transforms her wariness into a feeling of kinship to be celebrated.



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


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THE DICTIONARY OF DADS




ME AND AARON RAMSEY



Share a story you remember writing as a child


Encourage writing in everyday ways: notes, shopping lists or thank-yous

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
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WRITE YOUR OWN STORY BOOK

A fantastic write-in book that helps children learn to write their own stories.






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SQUIRREL AND DUCK: MISSION IMPROBABLE




PETUNIA PERRY AND THE CURSE OF THE UGLY PIGEON

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


